Required Courses

- Introduction to Islam (for Christian students) or Christianity (for Muslim students)
 - Interreligious Dialogue
- Practical issues in Muslim-Christian Collaboration
 - · Elective in the tradition other than one's own
 - Pastoral Placement in a Muslim or interfaith institution (optional)
